Downloading Videos from Popular Websites for Educators

The rules regarding the downloading of videos from various video websites vary from site to site. Each website has its own Terms of Use that determines, among other things, whether the user can download a video to be shown later or whether the user can only show the video by streaming its content directly from that particular website.

Each employee of our School Division must adhere to the Terms of Use of each of these websites as well as the Acceptable Use Policy of the School Division.

While it is legal to live stream a video from any website, this process can severely cripple the school division's network if a number of teachers/students are streaming videos at the same time. When downloading such videos, it is best practice to download them outside of school hours. Another option is to download and save these videos at home and then bring them to school on a flash drive.

Here are the rules from some of the most popular video sites for Educators.

YouTube

YouTube's terms of service can be found at the following website


Within YouTube's Terms of Service, **Section 5, Your Use of Content**, **Section B** it is stated, "You shall not download any Content unless you see a "download" or similar link displayed by YouTube on the Service for that Content. You shall not copy, reproduce, distribute, transmit, broadcast, display, sell, license, or otherwise exploit any Content for any other purposes without the prior written consent of YouTube or the respective licensors of the Content."

YouTube allows users to mark their videos with a Creative Commons CC BY license. Creative Commons licenses provide a standard way for content creators to grant someone else permission to use their work. By marking your original video with a Creative Commons license, an individual is granting the entire YouTube community the right to download, reuse and edit that video. As a result, teachers are permitted to download YouTube videos that are posted under the Creative Commons license only. Teachers can then save these particular videos for displaying within their classroom and retain them for future use.

Creative Commons

Creative Commons licenses provide a standard way for content creators to grant someone else permission to use their work. YouTube allows users to mark their videos with a Creative Commons **CC BY** license. These videos are then accessible to YouTube users for use, even commercially, in their own videos via the YouTube Video Editor.

To see if a YouTube video has a Creative Commons License, please follow the example below. **Search for** a video title and then click on the Filter button. Then click on Creative Commons.



The resulting videos are videos that have been posted to YouTube under the Creative Commons License.

If you are in doubt about the legalities of any video posted on YouTube, simply click on the video to play it and then click on the **Show More** option under the video.



Within Learn360's Terms of Use, under the section entitled **Use of the Material**, it says, "Subscriber may download, solely in connection with non-commercial educational use, copies of the Material designated on the website as "Downloadable". Copies of downloaded Material must be deleted or erased after use, termination of this Agreement, or termination of Subscribers registration- whichever occurs first. Any and all downloading shall be for individual Subscriber convenience only, and Subscribers may not (i) systematically download any of the Material; (ii) create distribution libraries from the Material; or (iii) sell, rent, display, exhibit or otherwise transfer any of the Material to any third party outside of the Subscriber's classroom."

As a result of these Terms of Use, a teacher is permitted to download a video from the Learn360 website but they must delete the video once it has been shown.

To download a particular video from the Learn360 website, login to the website using the username and password provided, click on the video and then select the **Download** button which appears below the video that you have selected. Now you can save the video for playback.



Within Teacher Tube's Terms of Use, Under **Section 5**, **User Submissions**, **subsection F** it states, "Teacher Tube provides the ability to download videos to your computer for personal or classroom educational use only, provided you give a link back to Teacher Tube in any presentation, website, or other form of media in which the downloaded video is included and give credit to the author of the video."

As a result of these Terms of Use, a teacher is permitted to download a video from the Teacher Tube website. However, they must delete the video once it has been shown.

To download a particular video from the Teacher Tube website, first login to the website using your username and password (or register as a new user for the site if you have yet to sign up). Next, click on the video and then select the **Download** button which appears below the video that you have selected. Now you can save the video for playback.



Videos from this site can be downloaded and shown in the classroom as long as you comply with the terms of the Creative Commons license and the Usage Guidelines. The teacher must delete the video that they have downloaded from the Ted Talks website once it has been shown.

Within the Ted Talks Usage Policy it states, "We make TED Talks available under the Creative Commons license "Attribution - NonCommercial - NonDerivative" in order to allow non-commercial entities (like bloggers, educators and groups of friends) to use them freely and easily. Important restrictions apply, though, particularly for corporations. TED's Creative Commons BY-NC-ND license allows you to display TED Talks under the following conditions:

- Attribution (BY): You must explicitly reference TED as the original source of the materials, and TED's
 logos within the videos and visuals as well as those of the TED Talks sponsors remain untouched and
 unedited.
- NonCommercial (NC): You can't use TED Talks (or any parts of them) for commercial purposes. If you are
 a company wishing to create a TED branded content offering, you will require a Distribution Partner
 License Agreement with TED. Please fill out our media licensing request form to explore the opportunity.

To download a particular video from the Ted.com website, click on the video and then select the **Download** button which appears to the right of the video that you have selected. Next, click **Download Video.** After the video finishes downloading, save the file to your H drive in order to play the video back. Downloading a video from Ted.com works better using the Google Chrome web browser.







The 4K video downloader software program can also be used to download videos from the YouTube, TeacherTube and Ted.com websites. It does not work with the Learn360 website. You will find this 4K video downloader software in the list of programs installed on your computer.

Using 4K Video Downloader

- 1. Copy the website address of the video that you want to download
- 2. Open the 4kvideodownloader software



3. Click "Paste Url" in the top left corner



Then pick your video quality, select the ellipsis button and choose a folder on your H drive to Save the file to. Now click Download.

Remember that only YouTube videos that are posted under the Creative Commons license are allowed to be saved and kept for future use. Other downloaded videos from the above mentioned sites must be deleted after they are shown.
